2023 Theme of Remembrance

In 2023 we are remembering military and civilian service

Service, the act of defending and protecting the nation's democratic freedoms and way of life, is rarely without cost to those who serve. Physical, mental, or emotional injury or trauma; the absence of time with loved ones; or the pressures that come from serving, highlight why the Remembrance of service is so important.

This year we are exploring Service through several anniversaries and events. We mark the contribution of a generation in uniform who undertook National Service, on the 60th anniversary of the last serviceman to be demobbed. This year also sees the celebration of the 75th anniversary of the Empire Windrush arriving in Britain. The ship carried more than 100 serving and former armed forces personnel from the Caribbean, and we are supporting plans to mark the major contribution of the Windrush Generation to the UK. We will also mark the 79th anniversary of D-Day, Commonwealth Day and Black History Month.

Order of Service

MAYORS CHAPLAIN:

What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? *Micah* 6.8

The Royal Tunbridge Wells Orpheus Male Voice Choir will sing 'Steal Away', 'Homeward Bound', 'Nearer my God to Thee', while wreaths are placed by representatives of service organisations, political parties and local groups, and members of the public.

Wreaths will now be laid by members of the community starting with the ex-force's groups under the direction of the Parade Marshal. Members of the public who wish to lay a wreath, please come forward now to the right-hand side of the War Memorial, where the Wreath Marshal will guide you to lay your wreath.

We would ask that wreath layers attend alone unless they require assistance. Please do not attempt to approach the War Memorial from the left-hand side. Thank you very much for your co-operation.

Following the laying of the wreaths please join in with the following hymn.

The March Past

Would members of the public please be mindful of those taking part in the March Past.

Compliments will be paid at the War Memorial and to the Mayor who will take the salute from the War Memorial.

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below. We are the dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow. Loved and were loved and now we lie In Flanders' fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe; To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high, If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders' fields.

The poem was written in 1915 by John McCrae, a doctor serving with the Canadian Armed Forces in Northern France. Three years later he was to die in a Military Hospital on the French Channel coast, within sight of Britain and it is said that on his deathbed he murmured "Tell them this, if ye break faith with us who die, we shall not sleep."

Flanders and Picardy, in Northern France, saw some of the most concentrated and bloodiest fighting of the First World War. There was complete devastation: buildings, roads, trees, and natural life simply disappeared. Where once there were homes and farms there was now a sea of mud – a grave for the dead where men still lived and fought. Only one other living thing survived. The poppy, flowering each year with the coming of the warm weather, brought life, hope, colour and reassurance to those still fighting.

After the war Moina Michael, an American War Secretary with the YMCA, bought red poppies with money given to her by work colleagues, and sold the flowers to raise money to help needy ex-servicemen. Her French colleague, Madam Guerin, proposed the making of artificial poppies, and their sale, to help both ex-servicemen and their dependents. The first Poppy Day, held in Britain on 11 November 1921, was a national success, and Major George Howson, who had founded The Disabled Society to help those disabled in the war who now seemed unemployable, recognised that the making of the artificial poppies might offer opportunities for his Society. His proposals were put to the British Legion (now the Royal British Legion), founded by Earl Haig, formerly Commander in Chief in France, and the outcome was the establishment of what we now know as The Royal British Legion Poppy Factory, which employs mainly disabled people, making poppies, wreaths and other items associated with today's Poppy Appeal. So, from John McCrae's emotive poem has arisen a powerful and achieving international charitable organisation, which has helped many thousands of people. (Copyright No. 5156)

Tunbridge Wells Cemetery Civic Event

A Civic Event at the Tunbridge Wells Cemetery has taken place on Remembrance Sunday in Royal Tunbridge Wells, since the Garden of Remembrance was formerly opened in September 1951.

The Mayor, Cllr Hugh Patterson, invites fellow citizens of the town of Royal Tunbridge Wells, to attend the Laying of Wreaths at the four War Memorials in the Cemetery, commencing at 12:30pm.

The first Wreath will be laid by the Mayor at the Cross of Sacrifice in the WW2 Garden of Remembrance, followed by other local organisations laying their Wreaths.

Wreaths will then be laid at the Civilian War Memorial in the Garden of Remembrance. The Garden of Remembrance is located close to the boundary wall with the Nevill Golf Course.

The Mayor will then lead those attending the Event along Remembrance Way to the WW1 Cross of Sacrifice, where Wreaths will be laid.

The Mayor will then walk to the RAF Memorial, situated close to the Cemetery Chapels, to lay a Wreath followed by other organisations.

There are 73 CWGC WW1 War Graves, 63 CWGC WW2 War Graves and 18 Civilian WW2 War Graves in the Tunbridge Wells Cemetery. 24 CWGC WW2 Graves were serving members of the Royal Air Force.

The Friends of Tunbridge Wells Cemetery have published two books, 'Remembered' and 'Remembered Two', which record all the lives of the service woman and men, who were buried in the Cemetery during the two World Wars. The two books will be available to purchase at the Friends Chapel after the laying of the Wreaths.

The Event will conclude at 1:10pm.

Please take care in the Garden of Remembrance if it is wet.
